Annual Health Examination

Hopefully at this stage you have purchased the best pet bird for your lifestyle, had all the preliminary tests done to rule out carrier disease states and have your bird on a good balanced diet regimen.

But, how do you monitor the bird's response to the diet and how the environment is affecting your bird as it grows, matures, becomes hormonally active, and eventually ages where its needs are continually changing?

Answer: The annual health examination.

Birds are "non-domestic" species and therefore instinctively try to mask symptoms when they are ill to avoid signs of weakness to "predators". Nutritional imbalances or deficiencies can take years to manifest themselves to the point an average owner will realize there is a problem. These situations are often quite serious translating to lengthy, more difficult, and expensive treatment protocols. Preventation in all forms of medicine has shown to be more cost effective than treatment of disease conditions.

An "Annual Health Examination" with a qualified avian veterinarian should include:

- 1. The weight of the bird in grams. Is it correct for the age and species of bird?
- 2. A thorough physical examination including an examination of the nares, ears, oral cavity and vent area.
- 3. A Complete Blood Count (CBC).
- 4. Gram stains or aerobic cultures of the oral cavity and fecal droppings.
- 5. Discussion of various means of viral protection by available vaccines.
- 6. Dependent on the bird's age and species, discuss other tests as warranted such as blood serum chemistry panels or radiographs (performed as a baseline in a young adult bird, then as indicated).
- 7. Discuss behavioral/hormonal changes to expect at each stage of the bird's life.

By keeping in touch with the "inside" of the bird as well as the "outside" of the bird, we can prevent debilitating situations or detect them in their early stage which minimizes treatment protocols and allows your pet bird to live a longer as well as a healthier, painfree life.

The Bird Gardens of Naples is located in the green space of Corkscrew Swamp with a variety of flora, fauna, bees, and butterflies. You will have the opportunity to see, learn, and interact with 100+ birds from origins around the world. If weather allows, groups can enter our large macaw aviary with opportunities to take photos and hold birds. Our guided tours last approximately two hours. Please bring sunscreen, bug spray, and comfortable walking shoes.

Also feel free to bring unsalted nuts to feed the birds, however, no peanuts as they cause diseases in birds. For safety purposes, please stay on the trail and with your tour guide at all times. If you need to leave early, please advise your tour guide. All guided tours begin promptly 15 minutes after the scheduled time. Our gates open 15 minutes before tours and close 15 minutes after, allowing a 30-minute window for all visitors to arrive. Once the gate closes and the tour begins, late visitors will not be allowed in. Please check our address prior to your scheduled tour to ensure enough time for travel.

We do not charge a fee for our educational tours, but donations are greatly appreciated and go along way to help our charity keep the birds happy and healthy.



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

Like many parrots that feed on wet food they seem not to thrive on a diet of pellets or seeds, which are the staple in aviculture. When fed a diet of vegetables or fruits they seem to thrive but add anything hard and they perish.



Red-bellied Parrots Poicephalus rufiventris

Red-Bellies occur in a large area in the Horn of Africa. They are found in Ethiopia, Tanzania, Somalia, and northern Kenya. They prefer low-lying thorny scrublands, particularly where Baobab trees are present; reminiscent of our own bushveld in the northern Limpopo province.

They usually make their nests high in the baobabs, as the wood of these trees is relatively soft and easy to hollow out. In the wild their diet consists of Acacia and other seeds, as well as wild fruits, especially wild figs. Red-Bellies can also cause problems for grain farmers when they descend on the corn, wheat, and sorghum fields.

Sub-species

Other than the nominated species, Poicephalus r. rufiventris, there is also subspecies, P. r. pallidus, which is just a bit duller than the nominate species.

The heat is one of the constants at this time of the year. It is the perfect climate for the majestic Golden Conure (Guaruba guarouba). Somewhat noisy, especially if they live in groups, they defend their territory if a stranger approaches.

Their bodies sway and they do not hesitate to open their wings to reveal the green color of their plumage, which resembles the Brazilian flag. This attractive, vulnerable species in the wild, with such a striking color has always been the target of many breeding centers in the world. However, its reproduction under human care is far from simple and although when it is achieved, the numbers can be high, it is not usually guaranteed a stable result over time.

How do you recognize well-fed young Hyacinth macaws?

It is well known that the quality and composition of the diet for young birds affect the condition of their feathers, skin and beak. This can be seen particularly well in young hyacinth macaws. Poorly and unbalanced nourished young Hyacinth macaws have blackish, dull plumage and pale, sometimes almost whitish skin around the eyes and the lower beak.

The young Hyacinth macaw pictured here is approximately 7 months old and not fully weaned. It has bright blue and shiny plumage and perfect toe skin without hyperkeratosis. Its skin around the eyes is an intense yellow color.

Both Hyacinth macaws can be exported in special transport boxes according to the IATA regulations accompanied with CITES export permit, veterinary health certificate and negative test results for avian influenza and Newcastle disease.

I travel a lot to visit our customers and their parrots to check and treat them at their homes. The specialized veterinary video consultations for parrots and parakeets we offer help a lot to get a first impression about the birds and their situation as well as the bird owners problems.

Some cases like nutritional issues can be already solved during the video consultation. However, most cases require thorough diagnostic and therapeutic measures, which I carry out in my veterinary practice limited to parrots at Graefelfing, Germany or as part of my home visits at the customer's location.

Appendix I includes species threatened with extinction. Trade in specimens of these species is permitted only in exceptional circumstances.

Appendix II includes species not necessarily threatened with extinction, but in which trade must be controlled in order to avoid utilization incompatible with their survival.

Appendix III This Appendix contains species that are protected in at least one country.




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Seabird Conservation

Seabirds (and waterfowl) are the only animals that have conquered the sea, land and sky. Over twenty species of seabirds live in the Caribbean, and many more visit every year.

Seabirds spend most of their lives on or over the sea, foraging, feeding or resting. They are highly adapted to this unique way of life. Many have webbed feet (to help them swim and dive), waterproofed feathers (to keep them warm and afloat), salt glands (that allow them to excrete the salt from the seawater they drink), and acute vision, a strong sense of smell and sharp bills (to help them find and catch food). Their long wings support them while travelling over the oceans in search of food and, on land, living in colonies helps to protect them from predators.

Before humans lived in the Caribbean (~7,000 years ago), the islands supported vast numbers of seabirds. On many islands, there were so many that their droppings (called guano) formed piles hundreds of feet high, and were mined for fertilizer. Today, tropical seabirds, like those in other areas of the world, are threatened by human activities. In fact, seabirds are now one of the most threatened groups of birds in the world. Many colonies are declining in size and some have disappeared.

On land, introduced rats, cats and dogs prey on eggs, chicks and even adults. In some parts of the Caribbean, humans still take eggs, chicks and adults for food and aphrodisiacs. Coastal development and sea level rise destroy and damage nesting habitat. Even the oceans are no longer safe. Seabirds often feed around fishing boats, and are caught and die in fishing gear. Overfishing, pollution and climate change have depleted their food sources. Hungry seabirds mistake floating plastic for food and fill their bellies with trash. Heavy metals from marine pollution also accumulate in their bodies.

Caribbean seabirds have much to teach us about the health of the seas around our islands. We need to understand their ecology, so we can protect them, their habitats, and the marine resource on which we all depend. Unfortunately, there have been only a few studies on seabirds in the Caribbean. This is partly because of the many practical difficulties in studying them, but they are also less attractive to funders than accessible land birds and migrants, and other mobile marine animals like sharks and turtles.

For most seabirds, the Caribbean is one large connected habitat. Therefore, it is important for scientists and conservationists across the region to work together to understand the big picture. This was first recognized in 1998, when we formed the Caribbean Seabird Working Group. Healthy seabird populations are possible in the Caribbean, but we must all work together to understand, manage and protect them.







Owl Rescue Centre

We've been asked numerous times to make an Owl Rescue Centre guidelines list. Here it is. We've kept it as short as possible.

- 1. We're open 24/7 for all wildlife emergencies.
- 2. We're open normal business hours for general enquiries Monday to Friday.
- 3. We're open from 7am to 11pm everyday if you wish to call and just chat about owls or otters.
- 4. We're not open to day visitors.
- 5. We do dinner events twice a month. If you wish to have an extraordinary evening and get to see some free wild flying owls, you must book. The funds raised from these evenings cover the owls food bill for the month. No more.
- 6. We can host pensioner evenings during a week night on request.
- 7. On request, we do allow a limited amount of bird photographers for a night walk on summer nights to get some evening shots. Zero charge.
- 8. We're not open to day visitors.
- 9. We don't take in individual volunteers at the Centre but we welcome companies to have volunteer working days at the sanctuary.
- 10. There is no driving on the sanctuary, all wildlife patients will be collected by our staff at the designated drop off at our entrance.
- 11. On request we can give progress updates on patients, but you can't visit the patients. Check numbers 4, 8 and 14 on this list for reasons.
- 12. Keeping our patients safe and secure in a natural as possible environment is our number one priority. Any and everything else comes second to this.

- 13. We welcome and appreciate all donations, in any way or form. Wood planks, old washing machines, chocolate and good coffee included.
- 14. We're still not open to day visitors.
- 15. We do have an Uber type volunteer WhatsApp group that runs patients to and from us and a few other rehabs. If you wish to have more info. Drop us a mail to info@owlrescuecentre.org.za
- 16. And lastly, if you need to find us. Google maps is your friend.


