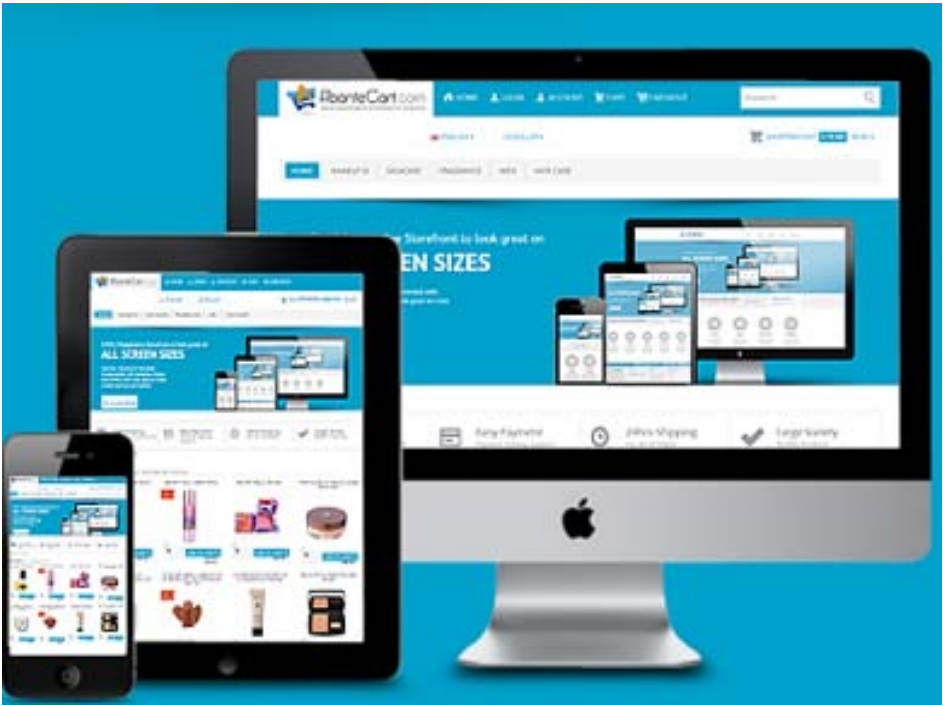

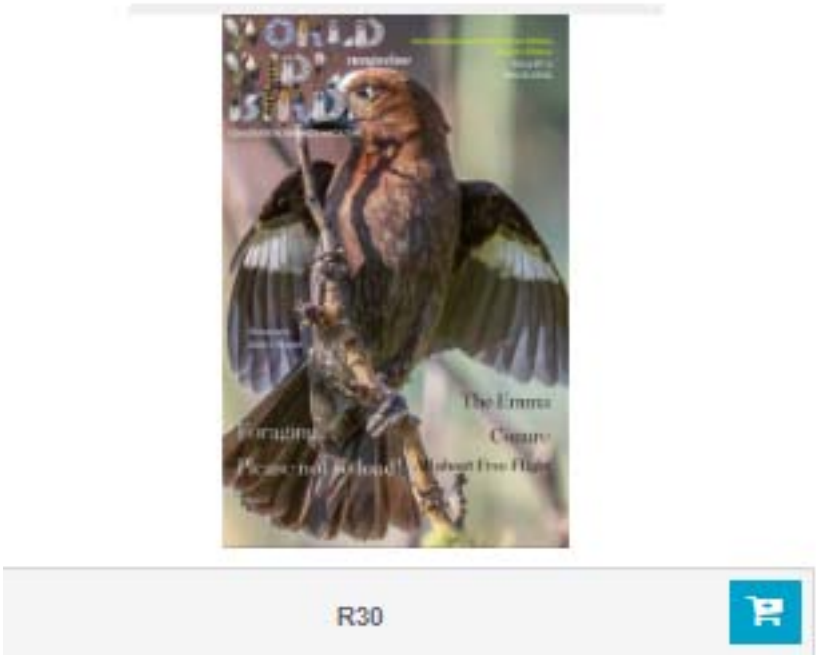

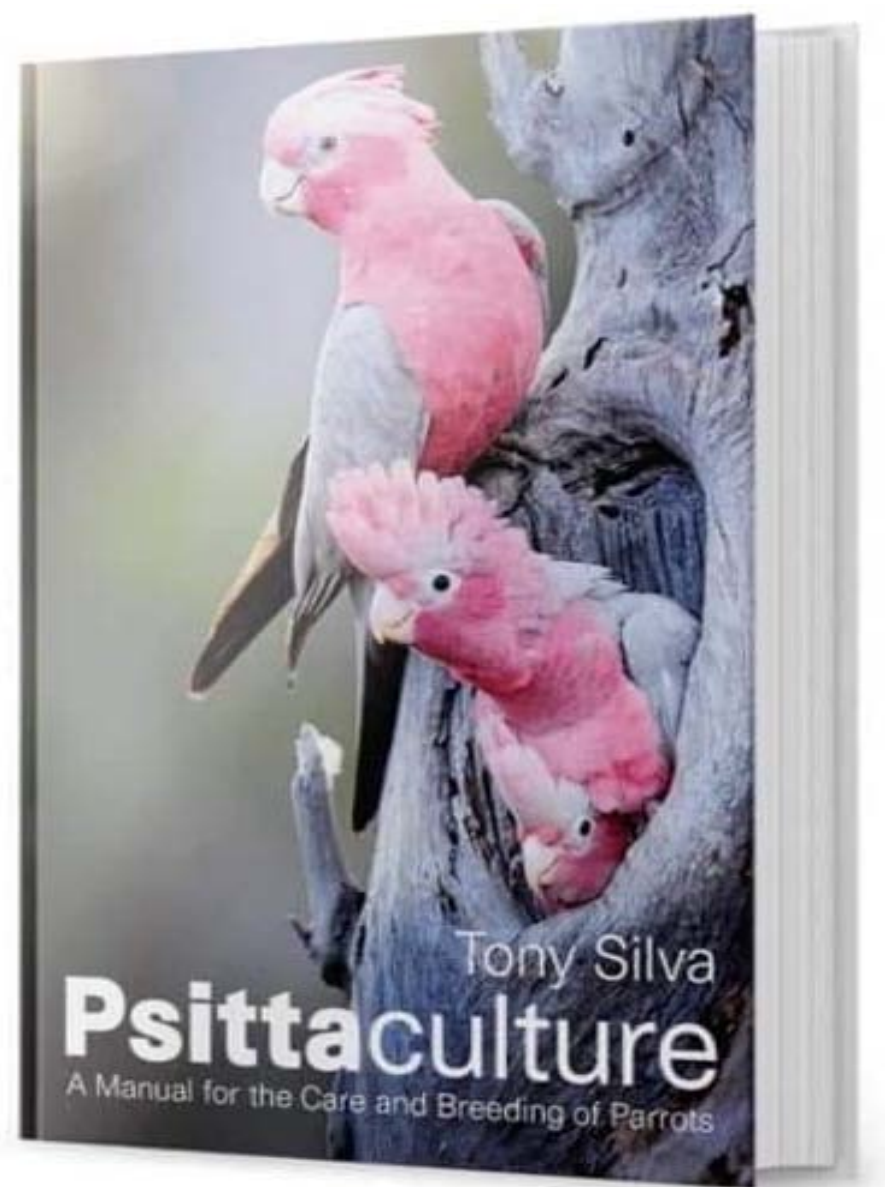

COMMITTEE AGAINST BIRD KILLING E. V. COMMITTEE AGAINST BIRD SLAUGHTER (CABS)

Who we are, what we do...



The Committee Against Bird Slaughter (CABS) is a charitable Non-Governmental Organisation working to protect migratory birds from illegal poaching and over exploitation. We are an activist association with a lean administration based from our Head office in Bonn, Germany. We have no subdivisions and are built on a coalition of supporter members who enable our work and volunteers who can react quickly, often in arduous circumstances.

When we identify an issue, we don't set up working groups or commissions, we don't hold conferences - we simply take direct action! It is this approach which we have taken since CABS formation in 1975 and we have achieved a great deal.

Our aim is to put an end to wild bird hunting - with shotguns as well as trapping with various traps or nets. We intervene where trappers, hunters or traders violate nature conservation laws.

All our actions are carried out in close cooperation with environmental authorities, the police, regulatory agencies and/or customs offices. Most government agencies lack staff and specialist knowledge to effectively enforce nature conservation laws against criminal bird poachers and traders. With decades of experience fighting conservation crimes, in more than 15 countries, our staff and experts help authorities with current actions and report hundreds of new cases each year.

Where the support of authorities is lacking, we take action ourselves. Each year, in Cyprus and Italy, we collect thousands of items of illegal hunting paraphernalia, free hundreds of protected birds and document our findings for press campaigns to pressure local authorities to take action. Documenting the mass cruelty to animals and the damage caused by illegal hunting on the environment is a central part of our work.

The current nature protection laws should be underlined by a strict rejection of any illegal actions. We try to improve the legal basis for bird protection through campaigns and initiatives at parliamentary level. Appealing to regional courts and the European Commission to review hunting laws based on solid casework and complaints is as important as being pro-active in the field.

Parrots are intelligent, highly social and complex beings with lifespans of up to 100 years.

The individual bird's best interest and well being of the present flock will determine if a parrot is accepted into the organization. We actively support networking with other parrot welfare groups, animal welfare organizations, the veterinary community, conservation organizations and the general public. Education is of the utmost importance concerning the well being of a parrot and its ability to successfully live with its human companions.

Visit The Bird Gardens of Naples

The Bird Gardens of Naples is located in the green space of Corkscrew Swamp with a variety of flora, fauna, bees, and butterflies. You will have the opportunity to see, learn, and interact with 100+ birds from origins around the world. If weather allows, groups can enter our large macaw aviary with opportunities to take photos and hold birds. Our guided tours last approximately two hours. Please bring sunscreen, bug spray, and comfortable walking shoes.

Also feel free to bring unsalted nuts to feed the birds, however, no peanuts as they cause diseases in birds. For safety purposes, please stay on the trail and with your tour guide at all times. If you need to leave early, please advise your tour guide. All guided tours begin promptly 15 minutes after the scheduled time. Our gates open 15 minutes before tours and close 15 minutes after, allowing a 30-minute window for all visitors to arrive. Once the gate closes and the tour begins, late visitors will not be allowed in. Please check our address prior to your scheduled tour to ensure enough time for travel.

We do not charge a fee for our educational tours, but donations are greatly appreciated and go along way to help our charity keep the birds happy and healthy.

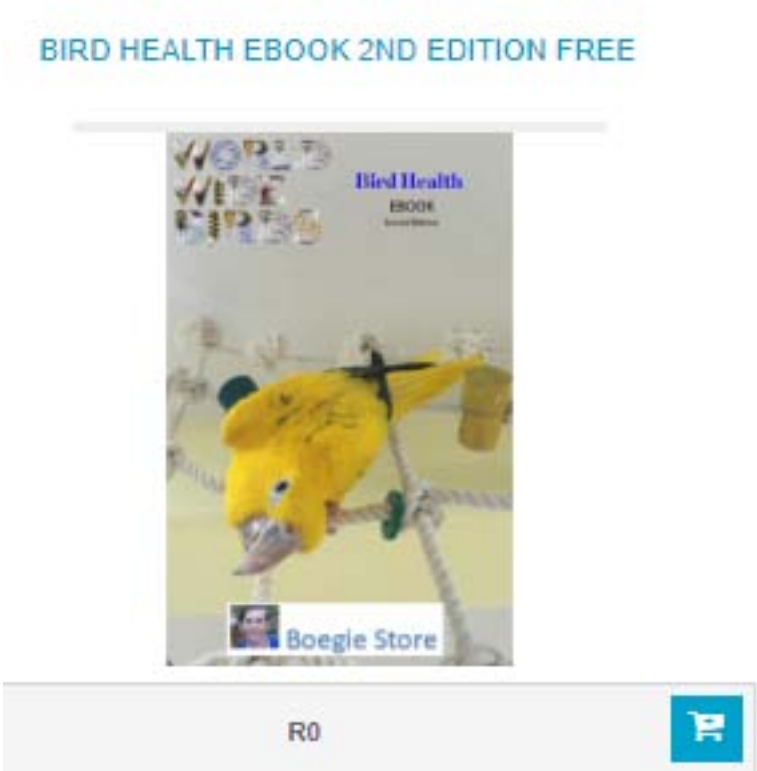

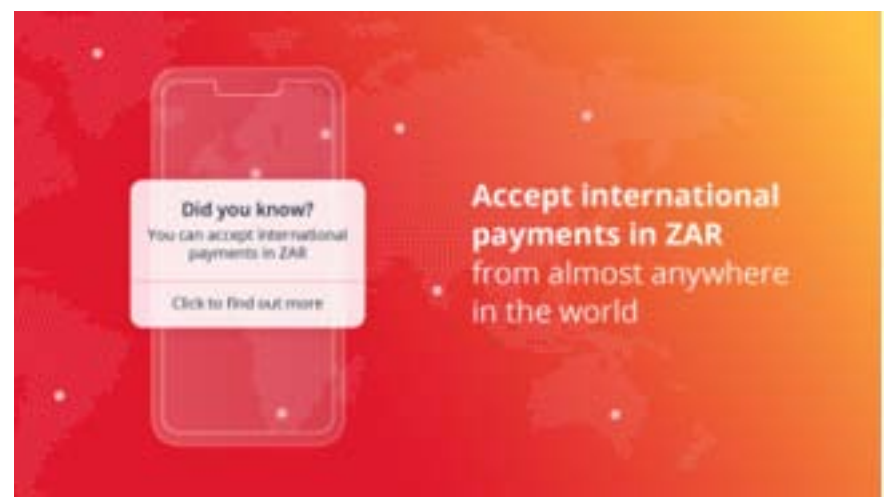

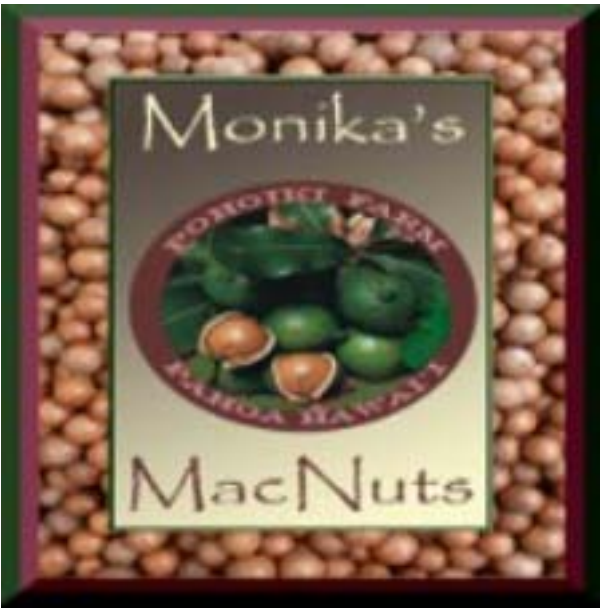

In this brief video I will be describing some benefits of enrichment and Palm Seeds and how I use them on a weekly basis. Enrichment is a natural and organic way to stimulate your bird and keep them interested.



Q: I ordered some last month. My birds loved them. I was wonder what the best way to store them? Can you freeze some of them? Thank you in advance!

A: Yes you can refrigerate or for longer term storage freeze them.

Touching some points that will be beneficial to your birds regarding diets & nutrition. Throughout the year there are four seasons which requiere different care for your birds wellness.



Q: hi Tony...can we feed our African greys a good amount of raisins...they are high in carbohydrates but those carbs come from sugar I think and I remember you telling us to avoid human grade fruits as they are sugar packed and sugars are not very good for birds...so please tell how much raisins can be fed to an African grey pair during the breeding season?

A: No. Raisins are NOT good for parrots. They have too much sugar.

Q: Tony, how much quantity of palm nuts we can give to macaw daily...pls suggest.

A: 5-6 per day.

The story of this remarkable baby calf birth started in the summer of 2008 when Eesha arrived at Safari West. Conures are colorful, clever, charismatic clowns that can be a never-ending source of enjoyment for their owners. All of this, combined with the fact that they are reasonably priced, creates a large demand by pct shops nationwide.

This demand must be met by captive-breeding in the United States. Private aviculturists have fared quite well in this area. Since a flight cage of only 3 to 4 feet in length will make most conure pairs happy, they are a bird that most people can find the room to breed, if they should so choose.

Almost all of the conures can be divided into one of four groups that differ from one another in some major way concerning breeding habits. There are a few “outsiders” that do not fit clearly into any of the four groups, but these are the exception to the rule and can usually be placed as intermediates between two of the major groups. What follows is a rundown of the conures most commonly available.

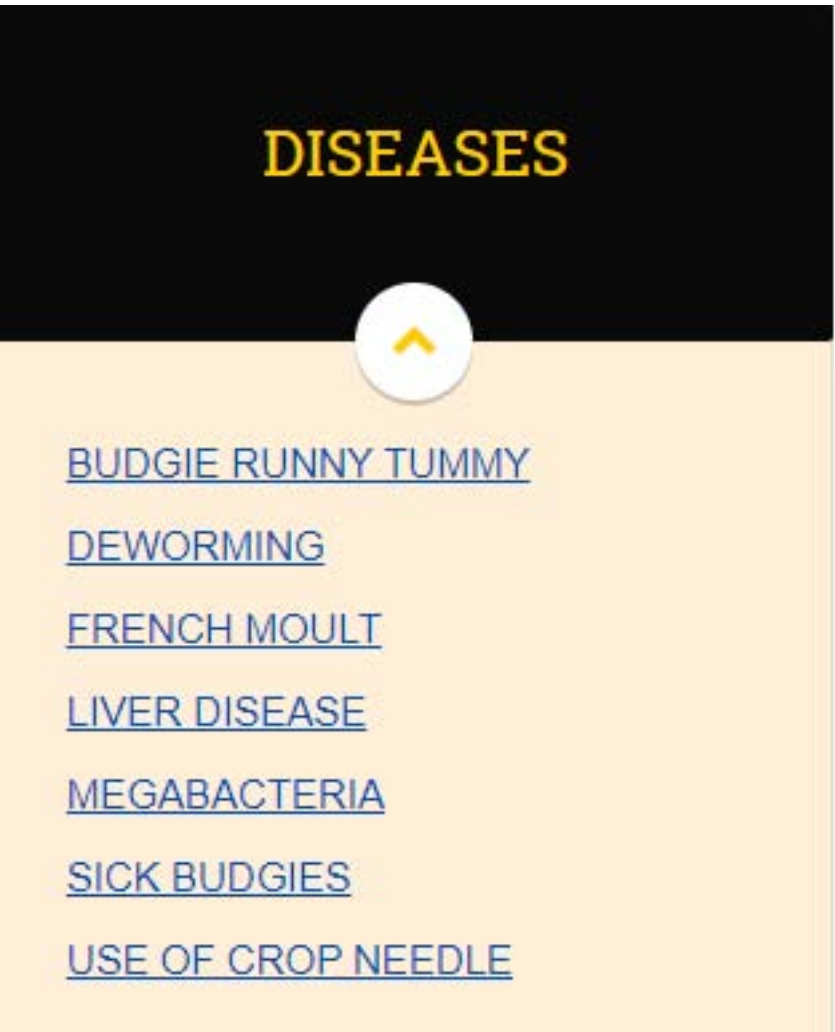

Do you ever wonder what all the supplements and little dietary extras actually do for your bird?

Pet birds do not get the opportunity to search for food outside as they would in their native environment. Foraging allows a bird to feed selectively and to supplement its diet in the event of the nutritional balance of the diet being inadequate. The captive bird is therefore dependent on its owner to provide a complete and balanced diet. This places a heavy responsibility on the owner to supply an adequate, balanced diet.

Confusion may occur when nutritional knowledge is transferred between species: what is good for humans is not always good for birds. This article is not intended to be a complete guide to budgie feeding but aims to give budgerigar breeders more background so they are able to make informed decisions about their own aviary nutrition.

How do you recognize well-fed young Hyacinth macaws?

It is well known that the quality and composition of the diet for young birds affect the condition of their feathers, skin and beak. This can be seen particularly well in young hyacinth macaws. Poorly and unbalanced nourished young Hyacinth macaws have blackish, dull plumage and pale, sometimes almost whitish skin around the eyes and the lower beak.

The young Hyacinth macaw pictured here is approximately 7 months old and not fully weaned. It has bright blue and shiny plumage and perfect toe skin without hyperkeratosis. Its skin around the eyes is an intense yellow color.

Seabird Conservation

Seabirds (and waterfowl) are the only animals that have conquered the sea, land and sky. Over twenty species of seabirds live in the Caribbean, and many more visit every year.

Seabirds spend most of their lives on or over the sea, foraging, feeding or resting. They are highly adapted to this unique way of life. Many have webbed feet (to help them swim and dive), waterproofed feathers (to keep them warm and afloat), salt glands (that allow them to excrete the salt from the seawater they drink), and acute vision, a strong sense of smell and sharp bills (to help them find and catch food). Their long wings support them while travelling over the oceans in search of food and, on land, living in colonies helps to protect them from predators.

Before humans lived in the Caribbean (~7,000 years ago), the islands supported vast numbers of seabirds. On many islands, there were so many that their droppings (called guano) formed piles hundreds of feet high, and were mined for fertilizer. Today, tropical seabirds, like those in other areas of the world, are threatened by human activities. In fact, seabirds are now one of the most threatened groups of birds in the world. Many colonies are declining in size and some have disappeared.

On land, introduced rats, cats and dogs prey on eggs, chicks and even adults. In some parts of the Caribbean, humans still take eggs, chicks and adults for food and aphrodisiacs.

Coastal development and sea level rise destroy and damage nesting habitat. Even the oceans are no longer safe. Seabirds often feed around fishing boats, and are caught and die in fishing gear. Overfishing, pollution and climate change have depleted their food sources. Hungry seabirds mistake floating plastic for food and fill their bellies with trash. Heavy metals from marine pollution also accumulate in their bodies.

Caribbean seabirds have much to teach us about the health of the seas around our islands. We need to understand their ecology, so we can protect them, their habitats, and the marine resource on which we all depend. Unfortunately, there have been only a few studies on seabirds in the Caribbean. This is partly because of the many practical difficulties in studying them, but they are also less attractive to funders than accessible land birds and migrants, and other mobile marine animals like sharks and turtles.

For most seabirds, the Caribbean is one large connected habitat. Therefore, it is important for scientists and conservationists across the region to work together to understand the big picture. This was first recognized in 1998, when we formed the Caribbean Seabird Working Group. Healthy seabird populations are possible in the Caribbean, but we must all work together to understand, manage and protect them.

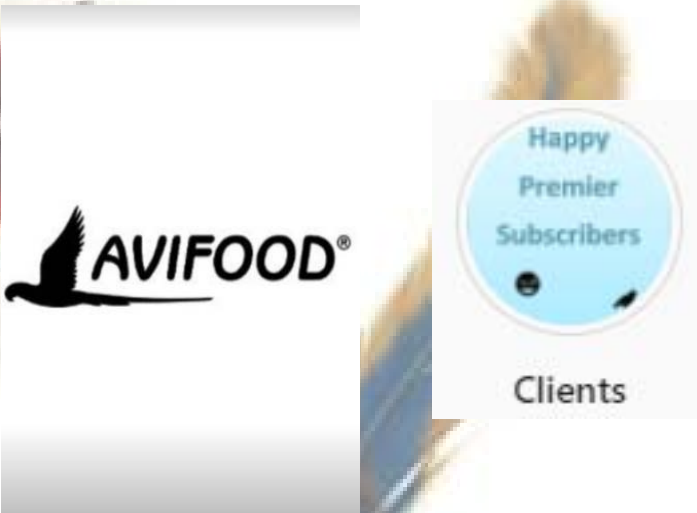

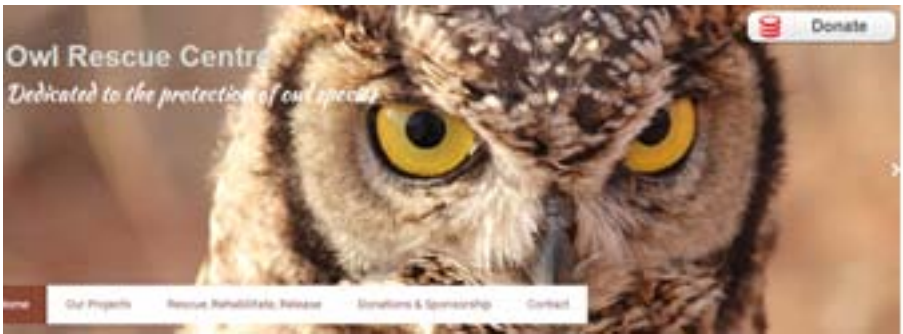
