
#### Different groups of pathogens

#### 1.Fungi




The best known example of a fungus is the common bread mold which is seen when a slice of bread is left for a few days. There are a number of fungi which can cause problems with birds.

Fungi are eukaryotic organisms. This means that they have a cellular structure, which is not unlike the cellular structure of the birds and even humans. The fact that they have a similar cellular structure means that they are more difficult to treat than bacterial diseases.



Yeast are another group of micro-organisms. Generally not highly pathogenic. Fungi reproduce by the production of millions of spores. These spores are very hardy and are difficult to get rid of.

Generally fungal infections in adult birds are not common. However one place where fungi can become a serious problem is in the incubation room. Fungi grow very nicely in the warm humid conditions in the egg incubator. Once fungi have established themselves in the incubator, they are very difficult to get rid of. Fungi are also of particular concern in very young birds, where they can establish an infection in the lungs and air sacs. Once established, it is virtually impossible to treat the fungal infection in the young bird.

#### **Conclusions**

In this first part, I have introduced you to the different types of disease causing agents which your parrots might come into contact with. I have briefly explained the main differences between viruses, bacteria and fungi. I have also explained the difference between primary pathogens and opportunistic pathogens. In the next two parts of this series, I will concentrate on the different methods to control diseases. I will look at the pros and cons of treating with antibiotics. I will also look at vaccines and vaccine development and how vaccines can be used to control diseases. In the final part, I will discuss the use of biosecurity and disinfection as a way to control and limit infectious diseases. I will also discuss the development of a new product, which has been especially developed for use in birds, and the roll that this product can have on disease control.



#### **Parrot medication**

Parrot medication introduction

As I travel the world, I see dramatic differences in husbandry protocols. In Europe, there is great adversity to using medications on parrots. In contrast, in Asia some believe that medication should be used as part of the husbandry, subjecting the birds to regular courses of medications. I disagree with both principals. Medications should never be abused, as they can cause far more problems than they are intended to solve.

A sick bird, on the other hand, needs aggressive therapy in order to keep its health from deteriorating to the point that it will not recover. The question of when antibiotics and the concomitant antifungals should be used is in my opinion very clear: when they are actually needed and never prophylactically.

Parrots are notorious for hiding an illness. They are in the main flocking animals. In the wild a sick bird in a flock attracts the attention of predators. This is why they hide their deteriorating health until it is usually too late. These birds then separate from the flock. In most cases, they are taken by predators long before they succumb to the illness.

## Quaker Parakeets and their mutations Myiopsitta monachus

Wild Colour

#### **Country of origin**

Quaker, or Monk parakeets, are found in a large area of South America, from central Bolivia and the South of Brazil to Argentina.

#### In General

Everyone knows the smaller, bright green parakeet with the light grey face and breast. Over the breast there are horizontal crossstripes. The males and females do not differ in colour from each other. The difference in build is also not enough to tell the sexes apart reliable. Therefore, it is recommended that the birds are surgically sexed. In nature they build big communal nests from branches in which separate pairs breed. The nests remind one of our own Buffalo Weavers' nests.

Many bird breeders have the negative impression that Quakers make a lot of noise. When they are kept in large colonies, they can be noisy. If they are rather kept in pairs in hanging aviaries with solid divisions, it is a totally different story, and no one will complain about the noise.

Quakers weigh between 90 and 135 grams. This large variation came about as a result of the inclusion of different subspecies being bred together over the years. The larger subspecies' genes are well distributed and through selection we can significantly improve the quality of future offspring. The acceptable, general-used, ring size is 6 mm. When working with rather small birds 5.5 mm rings could be considered.

#### **Sub-species**

Apart from the subspecies bearing the name Myiopsitta monachus there are three subspecies of which two resemble the Myiopsitta monachus, and usually just differ in size. The third subspecies (M.m. luchsi) is completely different from the others. The face and breast are a lot lighter, and the horizontal stripes are absent. As far as I know there are none of these birds in South Africa.

# COMMITTEE AGAINST BIRD KILLING E. V. COMMITTEE AGAINST BIRD SLAUGHTER (CABS) Songbirds for the cooking pot



In some regions of the Mediterranean, wild birds are sought-after 'delicacies'.

The consumption of songbirds as a "delicacy" is a deep-rooted tradition in most countries in and around the Mediterranean region; and is the driving force behind the trapping and shooting of hundreds of thousands of robins, thrushes, larks and other small birds throughout Europe each year.

Officially, the sale of songbirds taken from the wild is banned throughout the EU. However, as there is little or no control in most countries, huge criminal gangs have become well established in countries such as Cyprus and Italy, where several million plucked songbirds are sold each year to butchers, restaurants and private gourmet diners. In view of the enormous demand, the price of plucked songbirds on the black market has risen sharply everywhere in recent years, which in turn motivates many bird-trappers to catch even more. In Cyprus alone, the turnover from the illegal sale of blackcaps and thrushes is estimated at more than 10 million euros per year.

Huge cartels have grown from 'small fish' trapping birds in their olive garden to highly organised criminal gangs trapping on an industrial scale. In order to cover the demand, in addition to the birds shot in their own country, the demand is supplemented with birds smuggled in from Eastern Europe and elsewhere. In Italy, for example, the police regularly confiscate smuggled loads of thousands of dead larks, thrushes or wagtails that have come into the country from Bulgaria and Serbia. In northern Italy, CABS investigations have revealed that game traders importing hundreds of thousands of frozen sparrows from Tunisia each year. This practice was brought to an end for the time being following a criminal complaint to the European Commission.

If weather allows, groups can enter our large macaw aviary with opportunities to take photos and hold birds. Our guided tours last approximately two hours. Please bring sunscreen, bug spray, and comfortable walking shoes.

Also feel free to bring unsalted nuts to feed the birds, however, no peanuts as they cause diseases in birds. For safety purposes, please stay on the trail and with your tour guide at all times. If you need to leave early, please advise your tour guide. All guided tours begin promptly 15 minutes after the scheduled time. Our gates open 15 minutes before tours and close 15 minutes after, allowing a 30-minute window for all visitors to arrive. Once the gate closes and the tour begins, late visitors will not be allowed in. Please check our address prior to your scheduled tour to ensure enough time for travel.

We do not charge a fee for our educational tours, but donations are greatly appreciated and go along way to help our charity keep the birds happy and healthy.





## What's the cause of infertility in parrots?

Infertility is the vane of the breeder. There is nothing more disheartening than discarding a clutch of eggs because they are infertile. This problem of infertile eggs affects all species, but is most common in macaws, amazons and Eclectus Eclectus roratus parrots.

Indeed on a daily basis I receive messages from breeders across the globe describing the frustration they feel at the number of infertile Eclectus eggs they discard. No one has a secret elixir that can guarantee success. Rather it is often changing husbandry principals, improving diet, dealing with subclinical health issues and treating these, or providing the birds new mates because they are incompatible that leads to success.

Let me address each issue separately:

#### Husbandry

Parrots have evolved to fly, to explore and to interact. Very few species are solitary. Kakapo Strigops habroptilus live as isolated individuals, but virtually all other species live in pairs or more commonly in groups. #### **Frequently Asked Questions**

#### Can a budgie learn to talk?

A pet budgie can learn a vast vocabulary of words and phrases. A male budgerigar is more inclined to speak than a female budgie.

Some pet budgie owners might not even realize that their budgie is repeating words or phrases because a budgie tends to have a very low, quick voice that might be mistaken for chatter.

When teaching your pet budgie, a word or phrase, speak slowly and clearly and keep an ear out for these words and phrases when you hear your budgie chattering away.

#### What do I feed my pet budgie?

Budgies are primarily vegetarians, although they often eat insects in the wild. In captivity, there are many ways to provide a budgie with a balanced diet. To be extra safe, however, you should always keep a mineral block in your budgie's cage. It will make up for anything that his regular diet may be lacking.

- Vegetables Budgies enjoy a wide range of different vegetables including carrots, cucumbers, squashes, turnips, beetroot, corn on the cob, cauliflower and spinach.
- Grains In the wild, budgies thrive off grass seeds. In captivity, grains like oats, whole rice, wild rice, white and jap millet and plain canary are all excellent options.
- Hazardous Foods You should never give your budgie banana, avocado or chocolate, for example.

### My budgie is picking at his feathers. Is that normal?

A budgie will normally preen his feathers daily, keeping them clean and free of dust. So you might see your budgie sliding his feathers through his beak, nibbling at his feathers, scratching his head with his claws, and fluffing up. This is all normal behaviour.

If you find your budgie is actually "yanking out" feathers repeatedly (or yanking out one of his flock mate's feathers) it's time to talk to a vet.

#### Do they chew on things?

Just look at the beak, hooked, and you should realize it is designed to chew. In the wild they use the beaks to excavate nest sites for example.

Budgies' beaks are always growing. To keep them from becoming overgrown, these birds enjoy shredding things up and chewing on things.

### How do you recognize well-fed young Hyacinth macaws?

It is well known that the quality and composition of the diet for young birds affect the condition of their feathers, skin and beak. This can be seen particularly well in young hyacinth macaws. Poorly and unbalanced nourished young Hyacinth macaws have blackish, dull plumage and pale, sometimes almost whitish skin around the eyes and the lower beak.

The young Hyacinth macaw pictured here is approximately 7 months old and not fully weaned. It has bright blue and shiny plumage and perfect toe skin without hyperkeratosis. Its skin around the eyes is an intense yellow color.

#### In summary:

**Appendix I** includes species threatened with extinction. Trade in specimens of these species is permitted only in exceptional circumstances.

**Appendix II** includes species not necessarily threatened with extinction, but in which trade must be controlled in order to avoid utilization incompatible with their survival.

**Appendix III** This Appendix contains species that are protected in at least one country.

The main bird that is used for fostering is the Bengalese mannikin. Throughout the world, people use this bird to foster their finches — especially the Gouldian finch.

But before you race out and purchase 10 pairs and start to foster like crazy be aware that the really successful fosterers have spent considerable time and energy developing a STRAIN of manikins that will be good fosters.

One breeder I was lucky enough to visit stated that you only needed 2 Bengalese in a cage to rear other chicks. Two males, two females, or a pair were equally useful as foster parents! True. We saw the evidence for this in his parrotfinch breeding rooms. His plan was to allow his parrotfinches 2 nests, which he fostered, then they would be allowed to raise the third clutch by themselves. After this third clutch, they were rested. His results were unbelievable. The descendants of these birds are now happily producing young in aviaries the length of Australia. So much for their being useless!!


#### **Owl Rescue Centre**


